A Note from Ben Brustkern, Executive Director

As an organization, Friends of the Family continues to grow and serve more people daily. We have increased our capacity to provide more rental assistance, which means less people are experiencing homelessness in our community. We track data points that tell us about the progress we are making and since the beginning of January we have decreased the number of households who are experiencing homelessness from 267 to 190. **This is real impact.**

We cannot have this impact without every person that I am blessed to call a teammate. The staff at Friends of the Family is as dedicated of a group as you will find. They believe in the vision "Everybody Has a Home" and exemplify the core values of the agency every single day. When people talk about the great resignation, we believe that it is an opportunity to invest in staff. When you invest in FOF, we invest in the people that make real change.

PIT COUNT

The Point-in-Time (PIT) Count is a snapshot of sheltered and unsheltered people experiencing homelessness on one night in January and July. As an agency, we are trained through the Institute for Community Alliances on proper data collection, best practices for safety, and effectively reaching the most people.



On January 26, 2022, Friends of the Family staff set out with volunteers to reach individuals in the counties we serve, that were experiencing homelessness. We spoke with individuals that needed housing

assistance, assessing them right there on the streets. By reaching people where they were at, we were able to get them on to the prioritization list and housed within a short time.

The PIT count is a crucial piece to understanding the homelessness picture. With this data, populations such as youth, veterans, chronically homeless, families, and survivors of domestic violence are identified. When we better understand the people experiencing homelessness, we can gear our efforts and funding toward those populations. The PIT count helps us plan for the needs at our community levels, and demonstrates the needs for funding to other agencies such as HUD, the United Way, and private agencies that want to partner to end homelessness. The PIT count also helps bring awareness to our communities, making a typically invisible population more visible to everyone.

PRIORITIZATION LIST & HOMELESS HOUSING SOLUTIONS

What is a prioritization list and why do we care how many people are on it? The prioritization list is a system that providers use to determine individuals who are eligible for services and who gets to access services. Most homeless providers are required to pull people into their programming from the prioritization list using dynamic prioritization. Dynamic prioritization gives preference to individuals who have the highest barriers, are experiencing the most risk, and are the least likely to resolve their situation on their own without the help of a third parties assistance. When someone begins to experience homelessness and they seek out services, they complete an assessment, and they get put on the prioritization list. When someone resolves into a permanent housing solution, they are removed from the prioritization list.

In the past, for our service areas, the inflow into the prioritization list has exceeded the outflow of people exiting from the list. This means the list gets longer. As the list gets longer, the need begins to outweigh the services available and people on the list wait longer and longer without a home, waiting to access services.

How have we combatted this? Friends of the Family has put a premium on two things. First, we are constantly working to get better at case management. This helps us move people through programming more quickly to permanent housing solutions. As people move through more quickly, this opens up program spots faster and increases outflow from the list. Also, good case management not only helps someone find permanent housing solutions, it also helps individuals not reenter homelessness, therefore ensuring there is less inflow into the prioritization list. Second, homeless services have began to expand, creating more available program spots in general. Between these two things, the number of people exiting off of the prioritization list begins to be more than the number of people entering onto the list. As this happens, the list shrinks and people wait less time for services.

If we are able to do this for a long enough period of time, then we get to functional zero. Functional zero is when every person that enters homelessness has a housing program spot available for them. This is why the prioritization list is vital to the success of our agency and the many other housing service agencies around us.

Today FOF is recognized in many communities as a non-profit that works to end homelessness, but did you know the agency was actually established to help women experiencing domestic violence and assault? FOF continues to provide services and programming to survivors of violence in 14 counties in Northeast Iowa and understands the importance of safe shelter and housing options for victims of crime. This is why we celebrate National Crime Victim Rights Week (NCVRW), a week in April that is dedicated to the promotion of the rights and services of victims of violence. This year's NCVRW will be celebrated from April 24th-30th across the U.S. Each year a theme is selected for the event, with the 2022 theme being, "Rights, access, equity, for all victims". FOF knows firsthand of the struggles that victims face when seeking services, supports and interventions around their victimization and works to create better paths of access and response. Programs, advocates and allies often wear many hats in regards to supporting victims of violence; providing crisis counseling, shelter and safe housing, support groups, legal and medical advocacy and lobbying for better laws and policies that protect this population.
