#### HOUSING PROGRAMS UPDATE

## **Making An Impact Through Programming**

If there is one thing we know, it's that housing is the only solution to ending homelessness. And at Friends of the Family, getting people housed, permanently, is what we do everyday. You may not know it but we have 9 different programs that those seeking our services may qualify for. Although these programs continue to ebb and flow as funding does the same, we continue to provide opportunities to move people from homeless to housed.

In this past year, we saw the end of a impactful program called the Black Hawk County Housing Project (BHCHP). This program's goal was to work towards ending homelessness through rapid rehousing, case management and financial assistance. BHCHP, over the course of its three years of funding, served 410 households in Black Hawk County. Although this program has ended, we are thankful for its success and for all those in our community who were able to secure permanent housing through it.

In light of one program ending, Friends of the Family has begun work with a new program, Always Home. Although in a different county, Cerro Gordo, this program, like all our others, has the same goal; to get people permanently housed. Always Home is a permanent supportive housing program in which housing assistance and supportive services are provided to assist households with at least one member with a disability in achieving housing stability. This program is being provided in Cerro Gordo county specifically due to the high need and prior

to this, a program of this type has not been available to this community. Always Home has already seen success since it first started in January, serving 15 households.

We continue to see success in the programs that are available at Friends of the Family as the number of people supported and funds allocated to clients continues to rise year after year. To learn more about all 9 of the programs available, visit our website at www.fofia.org.

# Low Barrier Doesn't Mean Low Impact

When taking a look at Friends of the Family and our shelter, there may be some things you don't know. For instance, we are not a shelter for the general population, we are a crime victim shelter. This means that those supported have experienced some sort of crime such as domestic violence, assault, or trafficking.

We are also what's called "low barrier." Too often we see individuals stay in violent situations because shelters impose "barriers" to gaining access. These could be things such as sobriety, having a pet, no id or even being a certain gender.

At Friends of the Family, having a "low barrier" shelter means that these issues are not a factor in staying with us. It's why Paul\* was able to find his way to us and find success through shelter.

Paul was an alcoholic and had been in a violent marriage for 14 years and had made several attempts to leave. He said, "I was laying there rotting away. I had tried to leave before and had left for a few days in a row but never longer." He received a text from his wife one day that said, "I wish you were dead," and he finally decided to leave for good.

After staying in his car for 23 days, he found out about Friends

of the Family. After letting staff know his wife had located him twice after he fled, they knew he needed to leave the area and suggested our shelter.

When he got to shelter, Paul struggled a bit at first but then settled in and started to make progress. He made a 100 day bucket list of things he wanted to accomplish and on that list was get healthy, quit drinking, and quit smoking. He said, "I'm 67 and starting over, you can see how excited I am about living again."

Paul has since come a long way. He has gotten sober, found a community that he loves and finally has a safe and permanent place to call home. When asked what advice he would give to someone in a similar situation, he said, "If someone hurts you or puts you down verbally, give yourself a chance, you deserve it. We are all human beings, don't wait until you're so broken down that you feel unfixable. I thought I was unfixable, but I'm not. I deserve a chance." He then continued to say, " This place, it saved my life and continues to save my life. I got that chance because of this place, because of them (staff). They believe in everybody, they believe in this program. This program is to get you housing, but you're healing too. "

This sentiment echoes the culture at Friends of the Family, where employees are empowered to thrive both personally and professionally.


Executive Director Ben Brustkern expressed the agency's pride in receiving this recognition.


