A Note from Ben Brustkern, Executive Director

Over the past 25 years, Friends of the Family, has had the privilege to provide over 100,000 nights of shelter to thousands of men, women, and children. In the early 2000's, we provided space for up to 8 people to flee and today we can provide 21 beds of safety. We have seen the communities we serve change with time, but the commitment to help people has not.

Shelter has changed from being a long-term intervention meant for healing to a short-term intervention that is focused on housing solutions and resource connection. What we have learned over the years is that shelter is a process, but housing is a solution. Let me be clear that shelter still plays an important role in services, but without connecting people to a solution it only creates stress for those accessing services.

We believe that being a housing focused shelter is what makes us unique from other shelters. It is the conversations that start day one surrounding a guest housing plan to the way we track our average length of time someone stays in shelter. When people leave shelter into a permanent housing solution, we all win. I promise that we will continue to focus on decreasing time in shelter and increasing the number of people who can say they have found a home.

PIT COUNT POINT-IN-TIME

Twice a year, you may hear Friends of the Family talk about PIT or Point-in-Time Count. If you've ever wondered what this is, how we do it, or how you can get involved, read on.

Homelessness can look different to every individual experiencing it. When we conduct PIT count, we are finding and connecting with people who do not have a stable place to sleep from one night to the next.

PIT count is conducted by community organizations and volunteers and is required by the Department of Housing and Urban Development, or HUD. They use this data to determine, on a national level, if there is forward momentum in preventing and ending homelessness. But we also like to look at this as an opportunity to meet people where they are, get them connected to services, and ensure they have access to the support they need to move on to the next step: finding a safe and stable place to call home.

So how does this all work? A lot of preparation goes into PIT Count, including coordination of volunteers, mapping out routes and locations where staff and volunteers will be going and ensuring that everyone has the training they need to be successful, among many other things.

The night of PIT Count, around 45 staff and volunteers from Friends of the Family and other partnering organizations, are given an area within our service counties and from 6pm to midnight, go out into the community to look for and connect with individuals experiencing homelessness or housing insecurity. When approaching someone who may be in need of support, volunteers and staff simply start a conversation, tell them who we are, what we are doing, and see if they know anyone who may need help. We provide some snacks and supplies on the spot and can even doing a housing assessment if they are interested. This provides a gateway for people to potentially find their way into a housing program that will hopefully end their homeless situation.

We couldn't do this without your support. Friends of the Family is always looking for volunteers to help with PIT Count in January and July. WORKING TOGETHER TO CHANGE LIVES

Mo, one of two Friends of the Family Outreach and Diversion Specialists, shared this story of success showing it takes us all, working together, to ensure safety and success for those we support.

A Housing Support Specialist at Friends of the Family (FOF) received a call from the Waterloo Human Rights office.

The caller was a social worker, Sasha^{*}, seeking assistance regarding a case involving a couple with seven beautiful kids. They were living in an unsanitary home in desperate need of repairs. The landlord of their home was refusing to take any actions because he knew the family was unaware of their tenant rights.

Luckily they reached out to Sasha, who went right to work and diligently sought out resources for the family. This led to their case being brought to FOF.

Sasha was directed to an FOF Outreach Specialist. They were able to go down to the Human Rights office to meet with the family and assess their specific needs. After these needs were identified, FOF's shelter team was contacted.

From there, FOF Shelter staff was able to provide the family with a hotel stay. Once there was a space available, staff was able to transition this family to shelter.

Now, the family is receiving wrap around services to move them onto the next phase, more suitable housing and a place to call home. Also, with the help of the FOF shelter team, the father of the household, who worked an hour away from the shelter, was able to transfer his job closer. Since he does not have to make that commute every day, the family can save money on gas and build towards their future. His commute is now less than 10 minutes!

We are thankful to all the organizations who came together to ensure this family has a safe and stable place to sleep at night. That's some top notch advocacy!
